"It is an opportunity for children to be introduced to live theater," Weast said. "For some children the production is the first and possibly only time they will attend a live theater."

Despite the title, Annual Children's Theatre Production, Northwestern university students from a theater arts class, as well as other theater students, will be do all of the acting in the performance.

Weast said she spends each summer reading many plays, searching for a script that will appeal to children. She looks for a story that children and adults will like, but the plays will contain some historical and cultural references that only adults would understand.

"Presenting the Annual Childrens Theatre Production is my most favorite part of my job at Northwestern," Weast said, "to see the theatre full of expectant and exciting children is very fulfilling."

For anybody interested in attending the general public date, the play will be on Saturday, November 18, at 2:00 p.m. The entry fee for the production is \$1.25 per person.

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






'Daddys Home 2' a waste



Women defeated in opening tournament

The Northwestern Oklahoma State women's basketball team dropped their regular season opener to Northeastern State University by a final score of 82-75.

Despite leading for just shy of 75 percent of the contest, the Lady Rangers couldn't answer the 51 bench points that the Riverhawks accumulated during the game in tournament action at the GAC/MIAA Challenge in Durant.

Four Lady Rangers totaled double digit points including junior Jade Jones, who posted team highs in points with 17, as well as rebounds with nine. Jones also manufactured the offense with seven assists, guiding the Lady Rangers to a 48 percent shooting percentage from the field on 27-of-56 shooting.

Trailing 58-52 moving into the final quarter of action, the Riverhawks tied the contest up for the first time since late in the second quarter at 61-61 with just over seven minutes remaining in the game. The Lady Rangers had taken a 34-28 lead into the halftime break in a relatively low scoring first half of action for both squads.

A 7-3 run then put Northeastern in the driver's seat with less than five minutes remaining before back-to-back buckets from Jones and senior Amani Davis brought the Lady Rangers back to with-in one.

Davis totaled six points and two rebounds throughout the game.

Following a made free throw from Northeastern, the Lady Rangers committed a costly turnover with just under three minutes in the game leading to a lay-up that extended the Riverhawk lead to four. Timely buckets and made free throws allowed Northeastern to capitalize on that late advantage and seal their first victory of the season.

Freshman Kinsey Neiderer posted 14 points in her Northwestern debut, while senior Kori Barrios and freshman Bailey Brown each recorded 12 points. Barrios led the squad with a 2-for-5 performance from behind the arc, as the Lady Rangers hit 4-of-13 three pointers.

The Lady Rangers were also defeated on Saturday in the second game of the tournament. Just two second quarter points proved to

be too much to overcome down the stretch as the Lady Rangers dropped an 88-50 decision to Central Oklahoma in the final game of the GAC/MIAA Challenge.

That tough second quarter proved to be the deciding factor as Central Oklahoma capitalized on the tough offensive drought for the Lady Rangers and took a 44-13 lead going into the halftime break. The Bronchos continued to keep the Rangers at a comfortable distance and closed out the second half, handing Northwestern their second loss of the weekend.

Guard Jakeria Otey led the squad with 12 points on 5-of-8 shooting while also posting two assists and two steals. Freshman Kinsey Neiderer and Aneli Thompson both posted nine points while fellow freshman Selena McDonald led the way with six rebounds.

The Bronchos out-shot the Lady Rangers by a final percentage of 50 percent (34-of-68) to 28.4 percent (19-of-67).

Northwestern held steady in other major statistical categories, as both teams committed a total of 13 turnovers, but the strong shooting percentage and second quarter dominance pushed the Bronchos ahead.

Volleyball team falls in final regular season match against SWOSU

The Lady Ranger volleyball played their final match of the regular season against heated rival Southwestern Oklahoma State University on Thursday. The Lady Rangers fell in straight sets, 3-0.

The Lady Rangers struggled offensively to keep up with the Bulldogs. Sophomore Jennifer Eubanks recorded just 7 kills during the match. Redshirt freshman Kiauna Clark had 20 assists during the match.

Senior Carley Geer had a successful night, as she recorded 20 digs, which gave her the single season all-time digs leader with 402 total.

Despite the loss, the Lady Rangers are looking to prepare for the Great American Conference championship this weekend. Eubanks said after the tough loss against SWOSU, she and her team must bounce back not only physically, but mentally.

"We will need to be really focused and disciplined in our skill sets because that is a vital key to winning," Eubanks said.

The Lady Rangers first face Southern Nazarene University. She said she and her teammates are working on their techniques and skill set that has made them so successful throughout the season

She said the toughest thing about the tournament for her is knowing nothing is set in stone.

"There are all great teams in the conference," Eubanks said. "It's anyone's game so you don't really know who you are expecting to play the next day because it could go either way."

Eubanks has had a successful season as a Lady Ranger. She has broken the hitting percentage record twice in back to back games. She also has the second highest hitting percentage in the GAC conference and is in the top ten for kill leader.

"The support of the town and our other teams on this campus really help us thrive and persevere," Eubanks said.

Eubanks and the rest of the Lady Rangers will face Southern Nazarene in GAC championship in Hot Springs, Arkansas beginning on Thursday.

Men victorious in tournament

Northwestern Oklahoma State men's basketball came out on top of the MIAA/GAC Challenge tournament. The Rangers beat Northeastern State University, 61-50, on Friday.

To win the tournament the Rangers just needed to beat University of Central Oklahoma on Saturday, and they did just that. The Rangers defeated UCO 77-60.

In the UCO game, the Rangers had three scorers in double digits as Cody Halvorson (16 points, 3 assists), Greg Minor Jr. (12 points, 2 steals) and A'keem Oglesby (12 points, 2 steals) were all staples in the Northwestern offense.

Fresh off their season opening win over Northeastern State Friday night, the Rangers took to the hardwood inside Percefull Fieldhouse to host the University of Central Oklahoma Bronchos in the final matchup of this weekend's MIAA/GAC Challenge.

The Rangers led by as many

as 23 over the Bronchos, who came into the contest ranked fifth (preseason) in the MIAA. Shooting an impressive 54.2 percent from the field, the Rangers continued to charge ahead all

night and never let UCO back into the game.

Northwestern was lights-out from the field in the first half, connecting on 17-of-30 shots to take a commanding 44-24 lead into the break. After a frustrating three-point showing on opening night, Cody Halvorson found his stroke as the senior went 4-for-7 from beyond the arc. Halvorson continuously

sent a charge through the Percefull Fieldhouse crowd that was already fired up from Saturday afternoon's 35-7 football victory over SWOSU.

When asked about how difficult it can be to keep the pressure after building an early advantage, Ranger head coach Shawn Dirden said, "We came out ready to go. Our guys were focused, and I talked to them at halftime and told them we want to be consistent. Coming out with a 20 point halftime lead against a really good UCO team, you don't want to let up and you still want to be aggressive."

With just over two minutes to play in the contest, Tu Godwin and Hayden Graham made their season debuts for the Rangers. After a technical foul was issued to the Broncho bench, Godwin went to the line for head coach Shawn Dirden and sunk both of his free throws.

The Rangers next game will be at 7:30 p.m. on Thursday against Henderson State University in the Percefull Fieldhouse.
