According to Green, the reality of what had happened didn't really sink in for him until he saw a sign. "It finally hit me that it was bad when I realized all the highways were closed and my high school was flooded," Green said.

Green also said there is a sign in Houston on the highway. "Someone graffitied 'Be Someone' on the sign," Green said. "It's rather famous to Houston and the water had risen all the way to that highway sign." by Hurricane Harvey. Jones is a sophomore majoring in agriculture and she came to northwestern for softball. "I'm from Corpus Christi, Texas," Jones said. "I've lived there for 16 years."

Jones' first reaction to the news of the hurricane was to call her family to find out if they were staying or if they planned on leaving. Her parents decided to stay. "It would have been difficult to move my grandmother," Jones said. "So my dad boarded up the house and prayed for the best." Jones said she was surprised to find out that the most damage done to her family's house was a few downed tree limbs. However, Jones also said that her parents wouldn't be staying through another hurricane.



What do you do when you find yourself facing an adventure? Are you excited? Do you ask questions? Do you make lists? Are you nervous? Do you decide to wing it, even just a little bit? Because, you tell yourself, maybe adventures should be adventures—exhilarating and uncertain.

Facing my own adventure, I'm doing all that and more. More being a summer of researching, gathering, and packing. On September 7th, I'll be embarking on my largest adventure thus far: moving abroad for four months. In the spring, I was chosen to represent NWOSU as a Brad Henry Scholar studying at Swansea University in Wales, UK this fall. I will be there from September to late December. The Brad Henry Scholarship is a life-changing opportunity offered to Oklahoma residents in their junior or senior years at university. The scholarship involves all Swansea University tuition, fees, housing, as well as the airfare to the UK, paid for by the Oklahoma State Regents for Higher Education. 





'Dark Tower' uninteresting

Although technically competent in most regards, "The Dark Tower" offers a strikingly unremarkable movie-going experience.

The film is completely barren of any qualities that could lift it above anything beyond simply passable and makes few attempts to kindle its audience's sympathies or interests.

As I made my way through this film's incredibly long-feeling 90-minute run-time, I quickly found that I neither liked nor cared about any of the film's protagonists and was more focused on how much more time was left until the movie ended. I never could have imagined that a movie featuring a supernatural, gun-slinging Idris Elba and an evil, magic-wielding Matthew Mcconaughey could be so uninteresting. On a surface-level, "The Dark Tower" is not a complete train wreck. Among the film's merits are that it is at least coherent and has the visual appearance of being a legitimate major motion picture. The vital question to ask is: "What is 'The Dark Tower' missing that leads it to fail as an adventure-fantasy movie?" The answer is focus. The film spends too little time developing character relationships and maintain-

ing the tension of the imminent threat of a clearly motivated antagonist, and it instead focuses on delivering exposition for its overly complex setting.

Too many elements are introduced, and it doesn't leave itself enough time to give its audience reason to care about any of it. For most of the film, the protagonists' actions seem inconsequential and the antagonist's motivation is hard to keep track of. Films of this genre that work well keep a lively pace and contain colorful, exciting characters, but this film does neither. Despite its fun and potentially interesting premise, "The Dark Tower" simply does not possess the entertainment value that one would expect from a universetrotting fantasy film with such high-caliber headliners. The film is not offensively bad, but it had difficulty maintaining my interest for an hour and a half.



Williams said she thought she performed best in the match against Fort Lewis College.


