Shelby Bender: I will be performing a vocal solo to the song Lost Boy by Ruth B!


Macie Malone: I will be singing and playing the piano to the song "Only Hope" from the movie A Walk to Remember.

Lasik eye surgery was not something I had always wanted to do. My eye doctor mentioned that I would be a great candidate for it and I had experienced numerous sleepless nights at college which lead to dry, uncomfortable contacts. That's why I chose to have the surgery. It was then decided that the nearly \$4,000 procedure would be my college graduation gift.

The process was relatively simple. I had to meet with my regular eye doctor and schedule the surgery, along with a pre-operation visit followed by many post operation visits.

Fall break was the opportune time for me to have the surgery. On Wednesday, I was in Oklahoma City at nJoy Vision where they did all the regular tests, nothing new except dilating my eyes. I had never had this done before, and was shocked that my vision was blurry and out of focus for the next five hours. The optometrist made a joke about making my vision worse before they fix it. Outside the jokes, the doctor just assured me everything was going to go smoothly.

Thursday morning I showed up at the nJoy vision center without any nerves. I had only heard positive things about Lasiks and had no doubt my experience was going to be just as positive.

They took me back and sat me in a recliner where they gave me a pill to help me relax. I thought it was a understood why I needed it.

The operation room was small. I laid down on their so called bed where they got straight to work. The first machine they put over my eye was supposed to cut the be. They were able to transform my 20/400 to 20/20.

flap so they could begin correcting my vision. It was uncomfortable to say the least, possibly the worst part. I was fully awake, and although my eyes were completely numb, I could still feel the pressure on my eye as it was being cut.

From there they switched to a different machine. This is where they did the actual vision correction. They put something in my eye so I couldn't close it. Then I had to stare at the red light, while a lady counted down from 40.

By this time, I was very appreciative of the little pill they had given me earlier, but I wondered why it wasn't stronger. I could smell burning. The equipment was loud. I was uncomfortable. It was the longest 40 seconds of my life.


After that it was time for the second eye. It was basically the same experience on the second eye. The entire process was rather discombobulating because it was hard to tell what was going on and the doctors moved quickly. After the machines had done their jobs, the doctor placed the clear flap back in place over my eye. He also did other things to my eye, but I can't explain what they were.

Then it was over. The procedure took only 10 minutes. Immediately following, the doctor checked my eyes again, gave me a pill to help me sleep and sent me home.

My vision was hazy for the rest of the day and my eyes were extremely raw and sensitive. Thankfully, the sleeping pill did its job better than the first pill. I slept the rest of the day.

The next day, I woke up to basically perfect vision. My bit extreme since I was already so relaxed, but I soon eyes felt a little scratchy but better than the day before. I had another check up at nJoy Vision where the doctors were pleased with how my eyes were healing.







"It's open to all majors and all classifications, from freshmen to adults who have already graduated and are just looking for something different," Lauderdale said.

Students attending the fair should remember to dress professionally—not just your everyday, going to class attire, but something business casual. If possible, bring a resume printed on official paper, which is available at Lauderdale's office in Fine Arts.

"Don't be afraid to go up to them and just visit," Lauderdale said. "They are here because they WANT to hire NWOSU grads. And it's a great opportunity for you to get to know them- to see if that company is one that you would want to be a part of. And see who is hiring in your field."

Both teams did well with the men finishing sixth place overall and the women finishing ninth.

Fletcher said he accomplished a few goals he set for the season. He broke a school record for the fastest time in the

run at Fort Hays State University. He said one of his biggest goals was team growth. He said this growth was accomplished throughout the season.

Fletcher said in order to keep the momentum going into their next run and further, his team needs to stay confident.

"We understand we aren't the top dog," Fletcher said. "We just have to go out and run the best every week and it puts us where it puts us."

The Ranger men and women teams are both preparing to compete at Regionals on Nov. 4 in Kearney, Nebraska.
