Two men charged after stabbing at The Office bar

Two Oklahoma City men are in jail in Alva and a third man is hospitalized after an apparent stabbing at a local bar Saturday.

Bernard Meat, 20, and Ruben Butler, 23, were both charged with assault and battery with intent to kill and are currently being held in the Woods County Jail on \$200,000 bail. Both could face life in prison.

The victim, Levi Shipley, 33, no address given, is in stable condition at OU Medical Center, with wounds to his upper torso and the back of his neck.

According to Woods County District Court documents, at about 1:30 a.m. Saturday Alva police were called to a reported stabbing at The Office, 406 Flynn St. Upon arrival, police saw a woman, identified as the victim's wife, Chelsey Nicole Shipley, 26, running on Fourth Street near the Alva Fire Department.

Chelsey Shipley told police that she was running after men who fought with and stabbed her husband. Officers were unable to locate the men Shipley said she was chasing. Police then entered The Office and spoke to a woman, later identified as Roxanne Alvarez, 24, who was

not cooperative with the officers. Alvarez was charged with obstructing an officer, a misdemeanor, and was taken to the Woods County Jail.


Police transported Chelsey Shipley to Share Medical Center to check on the status of Levi Shipley. Officers were unable to speak with him due to the severity of his condition. They returned to

the bar and were able to view the surveillance video of the incident. They also located a witness who was able to identify the men on the video.

Police determined that Butler was in a house at 206 Barnes St. A team of officers arrived at the house and found four males inside, including a 17-year-old juvenile who was bleeding from an apparent stab wound. After the juvenile was taken away by ambulance, authorities continued

to question the remaining men and Butler was arrested and taken to the Woods County Jail. By that time, Shipley's condition had worsened and he was mediflighted to the OU Medical Center.

Police contacted agents from the Oklahoma State Bureau of Investigation to help with the case. The OSBI agents and police reviewed the surveillance video again and were able to identify Butler and Meat; they determined that Meat had stabbed Shipley



while Butler held him, according to court documents.

Police contacted Meat and asked him to come to the Woods County Sheriff's Office to be interviewed by OSBI agents. After they interviewed him, Meat was arrested.

Another witness identified as Jose Ramirez, 39, 216 Barnes St., Alva, was arrested and charged with obstructing an officer after police said he lied about being at



Alan Hall resigns as head football coach

Ranger head football coach

Alan Hall is stepping down from his full-time coaching duties because of personal health concerns and will focus on his own well-

Hall left his head coaching duties Sept. 9 because of undisclosed health concerns that occurred earlier last month.

"Today is a difficult day for our university, our football program and the Hall family," Carter said in announcing the resignation. "Coach Hall has done a tremendous job in leading our program through the NCAA transition process in the face of personal health challenges.

"We believe he will persevere through this current adversity, and we offer nothing but our best wishes for him and his family."

In the press release that announced his resignation, Hall said he wants to let the Alva community know he appreciates the continued support had has received.

"I would like to thank Dr. (Janet) Cunningham and Andy Carter for allowing me to lead Northwestern into the NCAA," Hall said. "At this time, I feel it is best that I focus on my long-term health and relinquish my responsibilities

of leading this football program. I would like to thank the town of Alva, the alumni, and the faculty and staff of such a fine institution for all of the prayers and support during this time. It means a lot to know that we are loved and cared for by so many."

Carter also stated in the press release that current interim head coach Kevin Turco will continue his duties until the hiring of a new head coach.

Hall compiled a 6-16 record in his first two seasons, including a 4-7 mark in 2012. During that season, Hall marked the program's first victory of the NCAA era, a win over Oklahoma Panhandle State University, and GAC wins over Southern Nazarene University and the University of Arkansas at Monticello. This year's team is currently 1-7 on the season.

Precinct 760007---Greenvalley Methodist Church Precinct 760008---Freedom Methodist Church


Voters can find out what precinct they live in by calling the board at 580-327-1452.

Local museum under paranormal investigation

Alva's very own Cherokee Strip Museum may have ties to the paranormal realm.

The Cherokee Strip Museum, located at 901 14th St., is ranked the third most haunted place in Oklahoma and just the Saturday we history of the museum itself is a little spooky. According to museum Curator Beth Smith, "The Cherokee Strip Museum was originally built in 1932 as the Alva General Hospital, but when the Share Memorial Hospital was opened in 1970 the Alva General Hospital was left abandoned. Six years later the hospital was turned into the Cherokee Strip Museum, but some of the rooms on the second floor still serve as surgical suites.

" Many of the displays we have in the suites are from the original hospital and these surgical suites are said to have some of the strongest paranormal activity. In between the two suites there is a blood stain that will come back even after you have cleaned, but I honestly think it could be iodine -- although not too long ago a second stain appeared just two feet away from the original and I just can't explain it. We have people that claim to see small orbs of light, or feel a brush of air against their face and some

people claim to see shadows and hear footsteps."

Director of Museum Finances Edith Weibener said, "Last had a team of paranormal investigators come in and they had fully charged walkie talkies and within five minutes they were completely dead." Smith added. "Some of the investigators we have had claim to have repeatedly seen the ghost of a military soldier and

the ghost of a little girl roaming around the halls."

Northwestern employee Alica Hall even recalls a scary incident that happened to her. "When I was in the eighth grade. the museum had decorated for the festival of trees and I was with a group of my friends by the post office section of the museum and I saw a person with red hair, but it looked like one of the old

mannequins so I looked away for maybe a few seconds and when I looked back the figure was gone. I asked my friends if they saw it and they replied, 'do you mean the person with red hair?' It was by far one of the creepiest experiences I have had in that museum."

Smith has had her own ghostly encounters. "In the many years I have been here I have only experienced two

encounters. I was on the second floor by the nurse's station and noticed that one of our pictures was lying on the floor by the desk, but there was no broken glass and the picture couldn't have just fallen off the wall because we have cement walls and the pictures are screwed in with sawtooth hangers. At the time, I thought that someone was messing with me, but the

Photo from alvaok.net people I asked swore that they had nothing to do with it so I just shrugged it off.

"About a week later I noticed that the same picture had fallen in the same place, but once again there was no broken glass and no sign that it had naturally fallen. I have not had any other experiences since then, but we always get investigators that say there is definitely paranormal activity

The Halloween tradition of scooping out the flesh of a gourd, crudely carving a haunting face into its rind and sticking a candle inside is observed every year. The common name for this is jack-o'lanterns. How did this tradition commence? Let's delve into a little

The original use of the phrase 'jack-o'-lantern' can be traced to the British. It was the name given to a night watchman, a man who literally carried a lantern in the 17th century. It also was the nickname for bizarre flickering lights seen at night over wetlands or peat bogs and mistaken for fairies or ghosts.

By the mid-1800s, a "turnip lantern" had its name changed to jack-o'-lantern. Young boys used the hollowed-out and lit-up gourds to spook people. Irish legend says that the jack-o'-lantern was named after a guy called Stingy Jack. He thought he had tricked the devil, but it was the devil who had his way. "Three, two, one." And a crooked, evil grin appeared on the figure's face.



Northwestern Oklahoma State University (14-7, 7-4 GAC) could not fend off the Savage Storm of Southeastern Oklahoma State Saturday night as the Rangers lost in five sets 2-3 (25-18, 21-25, 23-25, 25-19, and 12-15).

Northwestern was led by sophomore Asia Pipkin who finished with 21 kills and 13 digs. Junior Ashanti Banks also added to the offensive attack of Northwestern finishing with 18 kills. Sophomore Elisa Bentsen finished the night with 10 kills and 8 total blocks. Leading the Rangers defensively were Alina Fierro, who totaled 26 digs, and Megan Hentschke

who tallied 16 digs. Suka Tafao also added 44 total assists.

The Rangers found themselves in a close battle in set one as both teams exchanged leads for the majority of the beginning of the match. Multiple Rangers found open space on the Southeastern court and were able to build a small lead late in the set. Northwestern sealed set one on a 5-0 run led by kills from Bentsen and

The Savage Storm was able to jet out to a small lead early in set number two leading 8-11. The Rangers battled back and tied the

set up at 18-18 through their relentless attack. Several errors by Northwestern late in the set gave Southeastern the edge taking the set 21-25.

Northwestern Oklahoma had control of set three several different occasions but attack errors were the downfall of the Rangers. Northwestern could not hold onto leads they built having led the Savage Storm as much as 5 points at various times in the set. While the Rangers fought back it was too little too late and Southeastern claimed set number three 23-

The Rangers came out fierce in set four taking control of the momentum and gaining a comfortable lead at 14-8 aided by kills from Banks and multiple errors on the Southeastern end. The Savage Storm never recovered in the set as Northwestern made sure they would force a decisive set five, taking set four 25-21 thanks to the outside attack of Pipkin and

Set five started out with both teams battling close trying to gain an edge on each other. Back to Back attack errors by the Rangers

led to a 5-7 deficit to the Savage Storm. The Rangers just could not recover as Southeastern built a 7-12 lead and never looked back taking the final and decisive set 12-

Elisa Bentsen was named the Great American Conference Defensive Player of the Week Tuesday. This is the first GAC Defensive Player of the Week honor for Northwestern Oklahoma State University.

Bentsen – a sophomore middle blocker from Hesperia, California, was the conference's top defensive player for the week of Oct. 20-26. She was a large part of the Rangers success during the week as Northwestern posted a 1-1 record. Elisa broke her own school record against East Central for total blocks, totaling 12 for the match. Bentsen also added eight blocks against Southeastern Oklahoma State giving her an impressive 2.22 blocks per set in two matches.

"She certainly was deserving of this honor for her strong defensive play this past week" Coach Krieger commented. "Elisa's blocking has been a great contributor to our success so far"

Bentsen also added 17 kills in the two matches with a .316 hitting percentage during the week for the Rangers.

Rangers soccer falls to Bison at home

Just 48 hours removed from a dominant 6-1 victory over conference opponent Ouachita Baptist on Thursday, the Northwestern Rangers took on the Bison of Harding University for the second time this season.

The Rangers looked to find similar success to the OBU game, but a "lack of effort," as head coach Kasey Mahaffey put it, left them with a 2-1 loss.

The first game between the Bison and Rangers earlier in the season was a heartbreaker as the Bison wwere able to get the goahead goal with just 30 seconds left in the game. That earlier loss and the recent dominant victory gave the Rangers an incentive to try and silence the Harding Bison at home.

The Alva Sports Complex had plenty of fans in the stands from both teams on what was a very hot and sunny Saturday afternoon. When play began, the Bison were in full control early on but the Rangers defense was on point with help from senior Kaitlyn O'Toole and sophomore goalie Briana Legaspi.

When the second half got underway, the Rangers went on the attack. The attack though left the defense vulnerable to a counterattack by the Bison. After a missed call on the Bison by the head official, Harding was able

to get downfield and attack the goal once again. The Rangers hustled to get back on defense but committed a foul in the process.

Rangers football devastated in Durant

Northwestern took a devastating defeat last weekend on the road against the Savage Storm of Southeastern Oklahoma State University, falling 45-7.

Throughout recent match-ups this season, Northwestern (1-7, 1-7 GAC) has struggled dramatically to find structure offensively to produce the momentum and scoring needed against Great American Conference opponents.

Southeastern came out a bit slow early during the first quarter of play, as the Savage Storm turned the ball over on a three-and-out situation. Shortly after, Northwestern obtained first possession at the 14:05 mark in the first quarter, but could not get anything going offensively as Ranger quarterback Ty Hooper had his troubles under center finding any open receivers. Hooper started against the Savage Storm after being the backup quarterback to Reid

Miller, who returned from an injury against the Tigers of East Central University on homecoming.

Southeastern quickly retaliated on a Northwestern turnover as Delvon Wortham of the Savage Storm took a handoff from the 49-yard line and scampered into the end zone to give Southeastern an early 7-0 lead.

With the Savage Storm running the ball effectively early in the first quarter, Northwestern needed to return the favor. On the next possession, Hooper lined up under center for the Rangers as he took the snap and handed it off to Northwestern running back Zachary Doyle for a long 25-yard gain. Despite Northwestern's offensive struggles, Hooper and Doyle led the Rangers in a 75-yard drive that resulted in an early score for the Rangers to tie Southeastern 7-7 at the end of the first quarter. Doyle scored the only Ranger touchdown with a run from the Northwestern 21-yard line.

While Northwestern only contributed seven offensive points for the day, Southeastern took advantage of Ranger mistakes on defense as the

Savage Storm played phenomenally at the secondary and linebacker positions. During the first possession of the second quarter, Southeastern did not take long to get back on the board as they scored again on a short pass play to gain a quick 14-7 lead. Hooper fumbled the snap at the 33yard line, giving the Savage Storm another opportunity for a score. With only three minutes left in the second quarter, Southeastern capitalized with another touchdown, giving the Savage Storm a 21-7 lead. Plays later, Southeastern gained more momentum on its next three drives scoring three more touchdowns, making it 42-7 at intermission.

Coming out to start the second half, the Northwestern defense were able to cause some catastrophe at the line of scrimmage to slow down Southeastern's offense. Unfortunately, the Savage Storm were able to make its adjustments on offense during the third quarter, but the Ranger defensive unit provided a late spark in the third and fourth quarters to slow down the Savage Storm offense. However, toward the

end of the fourth quarter, Southeastern scored once more on a field goal attempt, which gave the Savage Storm a winning 45-7 score.

Four Northwestern defenders had marvelous performances against Southeastern. Linebacker Alex Hemberger had a career-high 19 solo tackles on the day, while Devin Peyton, Theodis Williams and Teofilio Freeman Jr each recorded 10 tackles.

Northwestern's offensive numbers were insignificant once again, as the Rangers only combined 236 yards of total offense against the Savage Storm. Southeastern ended the game dismantling the Rangers with 422 yards of total offense.

Northwestern will have a bye this weekend, but will take the field one last time at home against conference opponent Southern Nazarene University.
