Northwestern releases men's basketball coach after 15 years with program

Andrew Brown has been released as the head men's basketball coach at Northwestern.

After being at the helm of the Rangers for eight seasons, Brown accumulated a 119-112 record. The Ranger men tied for the Great American Conference in 2013 and since then have gone 21-32 in the past two seasons. This includes a 17-23 conference mark. The Rangers completed this season 9-18 and with a ninth-place ranking in the GAC.

Brown joined the program as a student assistant in 1995 before becoming a full-time assistant coach in 2004.

According to Northwestern's homepage, Brown was a full-time assistant for three seasons, helping Northwestern to a 57-39 record and making it to the NAIA National Championship "Elite Eight" during the 2006-07 season, a feat no other Ranger team has met.

Brown was also an assistant coach for two years at the University of Science and Arts. While at USAO, he was in charge of recruiting and helped with numerous other aspects of the Drover program.

Prior to USAO, Brown served as the assistant coach of the men's and women's program at Otero (Colo.)



Junior College. Both teams won the conference championship with the women going 27-5 and the men ending with a 21-9 record.

Northwestern's bio also mentions "during his inaugural year as head coach, Brown posted a very successful 18-11 overall record and a 13-9 mark in the Sooner Athletic Conference. He led the Rangers to a tie for fifth place in the SAC during that season, coached an NAIA Honorable Mention All-American, an NAIA Academic All-American and five SAC All-Conference selections".

"We are committed to building a program that can consistently compete in the Great American Conference," said Andrew Carter, director of athletics. "A change in direction is needed to accomplish that goal. Coach Brown has made significant contributions to the basketball program during his time at Northwestern and

has helped guide the program during the transition phase to the NCAA. We wish him and his family the best in their future endeavors."

Carter said the search for a new head coach would begin immediately.

When asked for an interview to answer further questions, Carter responded with, "I respectfully decline this meeting as I do not discuss personnel matters publicly. We have issued our statement and stand by it."

Longtime faculty member, dean announces retirement

Mike Knedler, dean of the School of Arts and Sciences at

will retire at the end of June.

Knedler has been a part of Northwestern for 32 years. During his time at Northwestern he has served as professor of music, director of bands,

and a Ph. D. in music education from the University of Oklahoma. He is also a graduate of the Institute for Management and Leadership in Education at Harvard University. Knedler's career at Northwestern began in 1983 as an instructor of music and assistant band director. In 1989 he became the Ranger band director until 2005. Knedler served as the dean of Humanities and Social Sciences starting in 1990. He reconstructed the University's academic organization and was selected as dean of the School of Arts and Sciences. Knedler said he has many memories about his time at Northwestern as a band director, as a professor and as a dean. He has also seen many changes in the school . He shared that his favorite aspect of the University is that "Northwestern is a hard-working, supportive community, and I have had many opportunities

for both personal and professional growth."

Many of Knedler's students have gone on to become successful band directors and people

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

12th annual Art Show opens this weekend

The 12th annual Northwestern Oklahoma State University Art Society (NAS) Art Show opens Sunday in the J.W. Martin Library in Alva and is open through March 27. The show is free and open to the public during the library's normal operating hours.

Students, alumni, as well as current and retired university employees will have everything from paintings, photography and quilts on display for the viewing public.

In the student area, Angelia Case, NAS sponsor, said that 19 students have entered this year's art show with 127 individual pieces within the three divisions of Studio Art, Photography and Artisan Crafts. Students will be awarded ribbons and cash prizes in each category. The prizes are \$15 for first place, \$5 for second and \$2 for third. The three division winners will each receive \$50 and the Best of Show winner will receive \$75. If all places in all categories are awarded, there is more than \$800 in prize money available to students.

Twelve current employees, one retired employee and five alumni have entered in the nonstudent area with 144 individual pieces. The non-students will be awarded ribbons for their winning pieces.

Everyone entered in the art show will be eligible for the People's Choice ribbon and \$50 cash prize. The People's Choice award is determined by those who view the art show and submit votes.

New categories in this year's show include three in the Studio Art division where the Paintings category has been expanded to Oil Paintings, Acrylic Paintings and Watercolor/Other Paintings. Three categories also have been added in the Photography division with Weather, Still Life and a special category of Selfie.

At the close of the campus art show, all of the winning art entries will be on display at a community art show to take place in downtown Alva at Murrow's FrameArt on Friday, April 3, during the First Friday Art Walk activities, 6 to 8 p.m.

Non-winning art from the campus show may be picked up in the library on Monday, March 30, by 5:30 p.m. Artwork from the community show at Murrow's FrameArt may be picked up at the end of that show at 8 p.m. or from Fine Arts 211 on Monday, April 6, by 5:30 p.m.




"Kingsmen: The Secret Service" (2014)



Our favorite secret agents are played by Colin Firth and Taron Egerton. Firth is wonderful, as usual, and Egerton is sure to be a rising star.



Rodeo finishes top five; Ranger wins Goat Tying

The Northwestern rodeo team not only competed at Manhattan, Kans., but claimed a few titles while they were there.

The women's team placed third overall, while the men's team came in fifth overall.

Northwestern had ten athletes made it back to the short round.

The Northwestern cowboys took over the steer wrestling. Four of the 10 cowboys that made it back to the short round were from Northwestern. Ty Batie won the long round with a time of 3.8. Jon Laine Herl followed close behind him, coming in second with a time of 4.0. Stephen Culling split fourth and fifth in the long round with a time of 4.8 and James Struxness followed with a time of 5.0, splitting sixth, seventh, and eighth. Herl took control of things in the short round, finishing his weekend first overall. Batie finished third overall, Culling finished sixth, and Struxness finished the weekend splitting eighth and ninth.

Herl, a Junior from Goodland, Kansas, said, "Overall it was a good weekend. It is good to be starting the semester off on a good note. Now I need to keep the ball rolling the rest of the spring rodeos. I'm just going to keep making the best runs possible for what I draw."

In team roping, Northwestern was represented by two cowboys in the short round, William Whayne and Dustin Searcy. Whayne roped with Connor Osborn from Connors and had a time of 6.2, placing third in the long round, which qualified them for the short round. Searcy and his team roping partner, Hunter Munsell from Western, had a time of 5.4, which won the long round and advanced them to the short round. Whavne ended up third in the average for the weekend and Searcy finished the weekend fifth overall.

In each of the women's events, two cowgirls made it to the short round representing Northwestern. In barrel racing, Shea Ransome and Kelsey Driggers were the two NWOSU cowgirls that claimed a spot in the short round. Ransome ended up second overall and Driggers finished the weekend fifth overall. In breakaway roping, Elli Price and Karley Kile made it back to the short round. Price came in third for the weekend, while Kile endured a no-time in the short round.

Shayna Miller and Karley Kile represented Northwestern in the short round of goat tying. Kile finished the weekend ninth overall, while Miller claimed a title and finished first overall.

Miller, a junior from Faith, S.D., is focused on being consistent at each rodeo so she can pick up points and win the region. She said, "I plan to work hard through the week, stay focused on what I am doing, and show up ready to compete at each rodeo." After winning the goat tying at the first rodeo of the spring semester, Miller wants to keep a good mindset for the upcoming rodeos. She said, "I am going to go make one run at a time and I can't beat myself."

The Rangers' next rodeo is at Garden City, Kans.



Rangers basketball swept by the Bulldogs to end the season

Northwestern women's and men's basketball traveled to Weatherford, Okla.,Thursday evening to face Great American Conference opponent and arch-rival Southwestern Oklahoma State. In the Women's contest, Southwestern produced quickly with a quick 11-1 run to start the scoring attack for the Lady Bulldogs.

Northwestern would finally get things in order, responding with a few transition baskets down the stretch.

Even though the Rangers responded on offense, the Lady

Bulldogs shot incredibly from the field throughout the first half, which caused a 16-point Southwestern lead going in at halftime.

During the second half, both teams came out unable to produce offensively, but the

Lady Bulldogs continued to dominate the Ranger defense in three early minutes of the second.

The Northwestern men struggled also against the Bulldogs, as both teams were tied up 6-6

In the early minutes of the first half. The Bulldogs erupted on a 26-1 run throughout most of the first half, which caused the Rangers to be down an enormous 32-7. However, Northwestern would come back toward the end of the half attempting to trim down the Bulldog deficit, which caused Northwestern to go in at the half down 44-20. During the second half, Southwestern took matters into their own hands by dismantling the Northwestern defense, producing numerous scoring runs that discombobulated the Rangers entirely throughout the second half as the Bulldogs took a massive 77-46 victory over Northwestern. Both teams concluded the 2015 season in the Great American Conference, with the men finishing the regular season with a 9-18 record, while

finishing 8-12 in the Great American Conference.

Alongside the men, the women finished with a regular season record of 10-16 and 9-11 in the Great American Conference.


